


The Board of Governors of Duck Island Yacht Club is the official governing body of the club. The constitution directs the board to oversee all operations, management and planning. It is made up of four elected members (2 year terms) and two ex-officio members (Commodore and Vice Commodore).

At the beginning of each calendar year the Board of Governors and Flag Officers set the budget and plan the program for the new season. Suggestions and ideas from members are considered for implementation. All issues relative to the constitution or by-laws are presented with Board approval at the Annual Meeting held in August or September of each year.

Throughout the year the Board meets as needed to address issues of membership, nominate the state of officers and determine special awards. Each board member is an active participant in the club operation and is available to serve members.

A special Trophy presented by the Board of Governors is the Dr. Merrill C. Hills award, given to the person the board feels made the most significant contribution to the sport of sailing throughout the year.

Happy 85th Anniversary Duck Island Yacht Club!



It all began in June 1932 on the front porch of a Grove Beach summer home belonging to the parents of our first commodore, William H. West. Bill and his friends Robert Floyd and Jan Taylor had recently graduated from college. Bill found work as a lawyer in New York City. His two friends, still unemployed and seeking ways to make money, planned to sell Dyer Dinks at the Larchmont Yacht Club Race Week. They thought if they raced the Dyers well, they would sell a few of them. However, only members of a yacht club could race at Larchmont.

Bill, Robert and Jan formed a yacht club and had it listed in Lloyd's Register in New York. The name came from the scene they were observing from the front porch. They reasoned the flag should be red, white and blue with a duck on it, preferably a Mallard. All was done within two weeks, in time for the Larchmont Race. Robert and Jan did not sell any Dyers, but they belonged to a yacht club!

The three charter members were taken aback when two weeks later, cruising yachts from the Larchmont Club anchored behind Duck Island, blowing their horns for the yacht club launch. The boys kept out of sight!

In the early 1930s, Duck Island Yacht Club became one of the charter members of the Eastern Connecticut Yacht Racing Association and twice hosted the Annual ECYRA Regatta. The club had an active racing schedule going most Saturdays and Sundays. The first classes of boats raced were Manchester, Handicap, Duck Island and Zip. Harold D. Brainard built the last two types locally.

Fredrick G. Winslow became Commodore in 1933 and served until 1938. At the 1938 Annual Meeting, the adults failed to show up. As a result, the teenagers elected W. Whitney Stueck,

one of their own, as Commodore. In 1939, Fredrick G. Winslow was reelected commodore and Stueck headed the race committee. The racing schedule had 29 days posted from July 1st to September 3rd. There were so many Zips showing up for races, they had two starts, odd and even sail numbers.

In 1938, the club had an opportunity to lease/purchase the Smith beachfront house at the western end of Grove Beach. Fortunately the members confirmed that they could not afford it as later that year the 1938 Hurricane blew the house away. In 1939, a motion was made to investigate purchasing the land. Nothing ever came of it. In 1939 the club purchased a new committee boat, a 22' 6" motorboat with a new 60 hp Chris Craft engine, from Harold Brainard for \$750. Throughout various years, the club rented the Grove Beach Tennis Clubhouse for their clubhouse.

During WWII, no meetings or races were held. Dues were lowered to hold inactive members and there were no dues for members of the Armed Forces. At a meeting on July 7, 1946, twenty members voted to start races on July 26th and by 1947 all was returned to normal



where the racing classes included Comet, Star and Zip.

Through the early 1970s, an increase in boat size to 30 ft was observed and the nature of the club changed from mostly racing, to cruising and racing. Duck Island now extended its visibility into Narragansett Bay, Cape Cod and the Long Island fishtail.

In 1982, 25 members created Connecticut's first "dockominium" at Westbrook Harbor. The plan included an

area for the DIYC Clubhouse. In 1987, our 55th year, the club achieved a long-standing goal of a permanent shore facility. No more standing in the rain waiting for race results!

1990 brought the purchase of a new committee boat, SITTING DUCK and the beginning of a new fleet of Catalina Capri 14.2s for frostbiting and young member training. By the end of 1996, racing classes included JY-15s and Vanguards, and in 2000 an Etchells class began. The Etchells class has grown to a recognized fleet of more than 12 boats.

Duck Island Yacht Club continues to initiate and support many social, racing, cruising and educational activities on Long Island Sound.

Duck Island Yacht Club House Rules

Nineteen rules have been formulated to assure harmony in the club house use. Please follow these rules. We work hard to keep the facility clean, stocked, and available for the many club functions we have throughout the year. It is imperative that we all take special care of our facility just as we do our own home. Volunteers are always needed at work parties throughout the year to keep our clubhouse and yard something we can all be proud of, so please contact a Flag Officer to volunteer your time and talents whenever possible.

Clubhouse Rules

General

1. Members should act with decorum and in a Corinthian manner when using the Clubhouse.

2. The Clubhouse is available for use from sunrise until 2200 weekdays, and from sunrise until 2300 Fridays, Saturdays, and days immediately preceding holidays.

3. The last member to leave the Clubhouse is responsible for taking in the flags, turning out the lights, turning off appliances, and properly securing the windows and doors.

4. All facilities are for use by members and their guests at their own risk. No responsibility shall accrue to the Club, its officers, committees, or members for compliance or lack of it, with the club rules as herein set forth.

5. Each member who is issued a Clubhouse key shall not make a copy of the key without the permission of the Vice Commodore. No member shall loan, sellor dispose of their key.

Clubhouse Usage

6. Vice Commodore approval should be obtained for any organized use of the Clubhouse. The Vice Commodore will keep a calendar for the Clubhouse.

7. Members planning to bring more than four guests to use the Clubhouse facilities should obtain Vice Commodore's approval.

8. The clubhouse is available for rental to groups associated with Club Members. Please contact the Vice Commodore for fees.

9. When the Clubhouse has been rented, a notice to that effect will be posted on the front door showing the date and the hours involved. During that time other members are restricted from using the Clubhouse.

Member Responsibilities

10. Members and their guests using the Clubhouse will exercise caution and discretion, and will be responsible for leaving the premises clean and orderly.

11. Member's children under 18 must be under the supervision of an adult Club member when using the Club Facilities.

12. Members will be fully responsible for any damage caused by themselves, their children, or their guests. (Any member who breaks or defaces Club property must report it to the Vice Commodore and is responsible for repair of all such damage).

Condominium and Club Property

13. Parking spaces adjacent to the water are for the exclusive use of the slip occupants.

14. Docks and associated ramps are for the use of the slip occupants and their guests only. Children must be supervised, and wear PFD's when on docks, ramps, or floats.

15. The property of the Duck Island Yacht Club will not be loaned without permission of the Commodore or Vice Commodore.

Restrictions

16. Smoking is prohibited in the Clubhouse.

17. No sunbathing is allowed on the deck and no wet bathing suits are allowed in the Clubhouse.

18. No personal gear, including food and beverages shall be stored in or under the Clubhouse. Lost articles will be kept for one month, and if not claimed will be disposed of.

19. Any complaints, suggestions or recommendations regarding the Clubhouse will be made in writing to the Vice Commodore.

Mooring Locations

Duck Island Yacht Club has maintained moorings since 1981 for the use of its active members, and the members of reciprocating yacht clubs. DIYC moorings currently are located at Westbrook, Fishers Island, Sag Harbor, and Block Island. Local governments may place restrictions on the use of moorings in their harbors. It is imperative mooring users recognize the authority of municipalities and their responsibility to enforce local ordinances. DIYC has been grated the privilege of having a mooring in these harbors; we do not want to jeopardize that privilege. Please be a good neighbor. Each harbor has its own Mooring regulations and Mooring Tackle Specifications. Please become informed of these regulations and specifications (see DIYC Mooring Regulations). Any questions about DIYC moorings should be referred to the Rear Commodore Cruise or the local Harbormaster. DICY is also listed on several registries of yacht clubs. These and many other clubs extend reciprocal privileges to members and their yacht clubs. If you would like to utilize these privileges, please contact the club you would like to visit, and tell them that you are a member of DIYC. Also when cruising, please remember to have your DIYC membership card with you.

Westbrook, CT Patchogue River

A fore & aft mooring is located in the Patchogue River on the south side of the channel, west of buoy 10. The mooring is marked "DIYC". This mooring can take up to a 31 foot boat and no rafting is allowed without the permission of the Westbrook Harbor Master.

Fisher's Island, NY-West Harbor

The DIYC mooring is located in the outer harbor area, approximately 75 yards south of the rock pile. The mooring permit number is "25", and the mooring ball is marked "DIYC 25". Two boats are allowed to raft on this mooring. The mooring is a 500 pound mushroom anchor. The Fishers Island Harbor Committee recommends 500 pounds as the minimum standard for a single vessel weighing up to 15 tons.

Sag Harbor, NY

The DIYC mooring number is "8". Coming from the North, it is located to the right of the break wall on the west side of the harbor at: N41.0.34/W72.17.50. The mooring is max 50 foot swing, and rafting is not permitted.

Block Island, RI

The DIYC mooring is located toward the south end of the Great Salt Pond, (New Harbor). It is located off the starboard side of the channel near the other (BLUE) yacht club moorings, before you reach the (Green) town moorings. The mooring ball and pickup buoy are marked "DIYC". All boats using this mooring MUST use holding tanks, and MUST fly the DIYC Club Burgee, per order of the New Shoreham Harbormaster. The Harbormaster enforces both rules rigorously, he may inspect your boat for holding tanks, and/or sealed heads, so please comply. Three boats are allowed to raft on this mooring. The mooring is an 800 pound mushroom anchor. The Block Island Harbormaster considers this to be the minimum stand for a vessel 46-55 ft. in length.

Mooring Regulations

- 1) Moorings are available on a "first come, first served" basis, subject to the following priorities:
 - a) DIYC members.
 - b) Where permitted, guests of DIYC members when cruising with a member yacht.
 - c) Where permitted, members of yacht clubs which grant reciprocal privileges to DIYC.

DIYC members may not offer the use of the Club moorings to other individuals.

- 2) Members must fly the Club burgee while moored. Where permitted, members of reciprocating clubs shall fly their respective Club burgees when moored.
- 3) Users of DIYC moorings are required to hold tanks.
- 4) Chafe guards must be used on **all** mooring pennants at **all** times. When rafted, **all** lines between yachts shall be protected from chafe at **all** times.
- 5) Yachts shall not be left unattended at night except by consent of every skipper in the raft.
- 6) Prolonged continuous use of a mooring (more than seven days) is not permitted.
- 7) Where rafting is permitted (two yachts on the Fishers Island mooring and three yachts on the Block Island mooring), anyone occupying one of these moorings must be willing to raft. The senior DIYC Officer present shall decide the advisability of rafting in inclement weather. Any advice given by the Officer shall not obligate the Officer, as the ultimate safety of the yacht and its crew is the responsibility of the skipper. If no Officer is present, the decision shall be made by the captain of the yacht first made fast to the mooring.
- 8) It is the responsibility of the member who is required to take another mooring. If upon arriving at a harbor in which DIYC maintains a club mooring, and finds that mooring is at maximum capacity (as determined by the harbor master) the club member is entitled to proportional compensation for the cost of another mooring from the yacht(s) on the club mooring. Example: There are 3 DIYC member vessels on the DIYC Block Island mooring. Another DIYC member arrives and must take a town mooring. The cost of the town mooring will be divided by the number of boats involved. The members on the DIYC mooring would then be asked to reimburse the member on the town mooring, their proportional sharing the members mooring expense for that day.

It is the responsibility of the member who is required to take another mooring to:

- 1) Attempt to appraise Yacht(s) on the club mooring of the situation.
- 2) To send, if necessary, the pertinent information (ie: the name of the yacht/members on the club mooring) to the club Treasurer within 30 days.

*Please note if the DIYC member is also a member of the Condo Association. It is expected that the member will raft on the Condo Association mooring, if available.

Mayday! Mayday! Mayday!...Sending a distress call

You may only have seconds to send a distress call. Here's what you should do:

Procedure for Digital Selective Calling (DSC) Radio: DSC MAYDAY

Procedure for VHF Channel 16 MAYDAY:

- 1. If you have an MF/HF radiotelephone tuned to 2182 kHz, send the radiotelephone alarm signal if one is available. If you have a VHF marine radio, tune it to channel 16. Unless you know you are outside VHF range of shore and ships, call on channel 16 first.
- 2. Distress signal "MAYDAY", spoken three times.
- 3. The words "THIS IS", spoken once.
- 4. Name of vessel in distress (spoken three times) and call sign or boat registration number, spoken once.
- 6. Give position of vessel by latitude or longitude or by bearing (true or magnetic, state which) and distance to a well-known landmark such as a navigational aid or small is land, or in any terms which will assist a responding station in locating the vessel in distress. Include any information on vessel movement such as course, speed and destination.
- 7. Nature of distress (sinking, fire etc.).
- 8. Kind of assistance desired.
- 9. Number of persons onboard.
- 10. Any other information which might facilitate rescue, such as length or tonnage of vessel, number of persons needing medical attention, color hull, cabin, masks, etc.
- 11. The word "OVER"

Stay by the radio if possible. Even after the message has been received, the Coast Guard can find you more quickly if you can transmita signal on which a rescue boat or aircraft can home.

For example:

MAYDAY-MAYDAY-MAYDAY THIS IS BLUE DUCK-BLUE DUCK-BLUE DUCK WA1234 MAYDAY THIS IS BLUE DUCK CAPE HENRY LIGHT BEARS 185 DEGREES MAGNETIC-DISTANCE 2 MILES STRUCK SUBMERGED OBJECT NEED PUMPS-MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AND TOW THREE ADULTS, TWO CHILDREN ONBOARD ONE PERSON COMPOUND FRACTURE OF ARM ESTIMATE CAN REMAIN AFLOAT TWO HOURS BLUE DUCK IS THIRTY TWO FOOT CABIN CRUISER-WHITE HULL-BLUE DECK HOUSE OVER

Repeat at intervals until an answer is received.

If you hear a distress call...

If you hear a distress message from a vessel and it is not answered, then **you** must answer. If you are reasonably sure that the distressed vessel is not in your vicinity, you should wait a short time for others to acknowledge.

MF/HF Radiotelephone

Your VHF radio is intended mainly for short range communications, generally 5-10 miles, and at least 20 miles to a USCG station. To communicate at longer ranges, you will normally need a satellite telephone or an MF/HF marine radiotelephone. Marine radiotelephone equipment normally operates between 2 - 26 MHz using single sideband emissions. MF/HF marine radiotelephones can also be used to receive high seas weather broadcasts, and by using a computer and a special interface provided by some coast stations, can provide Internet email.

What to do if no one responds to your distress call

Tune your HF radiotelephone to an HF channel guarded by the Coast Guard, and repeat your mayday call. Activate your EPIRB.

Boater Calling Channel (VHF Channel 9)

The Federal Communications Commission established VHF-FM channel 9 as a supplementary calling channel for noncommercial vessels (recreational boaters) at the request of the Coast Guard. A ship or shore unit wishing to call a boater would do so on channel 9, and anyone (boaters included) wishing to call a commercial ship or shore activity would continue to do so on channel 16. Recreational boaters would continue to call the Coast Guard and any commercial facility on channel 16.

The purpose of the FCC regulation was to relieve congestion on VHF channel 16, the distress, safety and calling frequency. FC C regulations require boaters having VHF radios to maintain a watch on either VHF channel 9 or channel 16, whenever the radio is turned on and not communicating with another station.

Since the Coast Guard generally does not have the capability of announcing an urgent marine information broadcast or weather warning on channel 9, use of channel 9 is optional. We recommend boaters normally keep tuned to and use channel 16 in those waters unles s otherwise notified by the Coast Guard.




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RACING

Duck Island YC starts the racing season the first week in May and concludes the season in mid-October, ending with the annual Thundermug regatta. Racing includes a weekly Wednesday night series, a weekly Thursday One Design series, a Cruiser/Racer series, the Shirley Hall series (female skipper and 50% female crew) and the Commodore's Cup.
